Summary

Kathleen R. McNamara is Professor of Government and Foreign Service at Georgetown University, where she has previously served as a Vice Dean for Faculty & Graduate Affairs, and Director of the Mortara Center for International Studies. Her work focuses on central banking, industrial policy, globalization, the European Union, and the transatlantic relationship, with particular interest in how markets, power, and culture interact. She is the author of *The Politics of Everyday Europe: Constructing Political Authority in the European Union* and *The Currency of Ideas: Monetary Politics in the European Union*, as well as articles in journals like *Comparative Political* Studies, *International Organization*, JCMS, and *Review of International Political Economy*. At Georgetown, she co-directs, with Professor Abe Newman, the Global Political Economy Project, which seeks to reinvent the study of political economy to make globalization work for all. She has provided analysis to the National Intelligence Council and other government bodies, and is a commentator in public fora and media outlets such as *Foreign Affairs, Foreign Policy, the Washington Post*, and on National Public Radio's *All Things Considered* and *Marketplace*. McNamara received her PhD in Political Science from Columbia University and her BA Honours in Geography from McGill University.
